

Greetings from the South-Central District where lately warm weather has been replaced by HOT. It's been a 100° or more for several weeks with a few days over 105°. Ameraucanas tolerate the high temps' fine up to 105°, which is the point where some will pass by having heat strokes. Thus far we haven't lost any due to the heat, even though there have been a few days over 105°.

The popularity of Ameraucanas is on the rise again, in the South-Central district. We have had more request for both layers and show quality breeder birds than we have ever had during the Summer. I was concerned, that record high feed and fuel prices might greatly affect the sale of birds, causing even more problems for the hobby, but it hasn't had a large negative effect, just cost more to raise them. Grain producers (farmers) are going to have to get more for their products as diesel, fertilizer, taxes, labor, equipment and seed cost them more. They won't continue to plant a crop and lose money on it! It would be a sad situation if we had to import feed grains due to the U.S. farmers not planting any. The higher feed cost will eventually show up in the grocery stores, causing higher meat, egg and dairy products. It may be a good time to have a food source in the backyard.

The fall show season will soon be here. I'm looking forward to some cooler weather, so we can prepare some for the shows. Our district show will be at Sedalia, Missouri, Oct. 11 two week-ends before the National at Hutchinson, Minnesota on Oct. 24-26. The Oklahoma State meet is Dec. 13 & 14 at Shawnee. I hope to see you at the shows this fall.

Blast from the Past: That Marginal Bird,

by Don Cable, Summer 1982

As I was looking for a Blast from the Past for this bulletin I though it would be appropriate to reprint the following article about marginal birds.

And ancient cocker, whose advice - like his birds – was often found wanting, once said to me in a moment of rare insight, "A poultry man's best friend is his axe!" Now knowing and doing are often strangers, yet event he least aware must cull his flock occasionally to eliminate the obvious misfits. However, it is not the bird with the glaring defects that tend to undo our well-laid plans, but rather the bird that we feel is too good to cull, yet just not good enough to sell, either,. It is the bird that for various reasons – in retrospect, often the flimsiest – that we keep, and in doing so, often do ourselves and our flock a disservice. In short, this is that marginal bird.

More often than not, the marginal bird is a pullet. Typically, breeders are much tougher in selecting cockerels since the majority of breeding units seem to be trios or small pens of four or five birds. Those breeders who pair mates are one leg up on the rest, assuming of course, that they are equally selective with both sexes.

Breed only from your best! How many times have you read or heard this? It is probably the best advice in the world, yet somehow that marginal birds seems to find here way into your third or fourth best mating, and guess who's eggs wind up in the incubator when the hens of your better matings are in a laying slump and you find all of that extra room in the incubator egg tray? After all, she's with a good cockerel and long shots do occasionally pay off, right? Well, in three weeks you have marginal chicks to brood, which not only compete with your better chicks for space, heat and that expensive starter feed, but do their part to help inflate those ever increasing electric bills.

Thus, the marginal bird – or birds, depending on how well we deceive ourselves – are kept, "just in case" and increase our feed bill, our workload and compete for space with worthier specimens. Just how much feed will a hen put away in a year's time? Large birds will eat about a hundred pounds while a bantam of average size will consume a good portion of this – even the time Coturnix quail will more than twenty pounds in a year! If, line most breeders, you are buying and feeding a commercially prepared mix, then you may now have an idea of just wheat that marginal bird is beginning to cost you. Multiply that figure times the number of marginal birds that you are keeping and you may really have something to mull over.

Could the marginal bird be the best looking specimen in your flock? Certainly, if she does not produce viable chicks or is generally unproductive. Each breeder must make this decision based upon his knowledge and understanding of the strengths and weaknesses of his family of birds and what he perceives to be the basic worth of each individual.

So what is the bottom line? What is that marginal bird actually costing you – in time, money and mediocrity? Think it over. You may find that for a variety of reasons that marginal bird is definitely a great deal more than you can afford.

The Minnesota State Poultry Association Show will be held at the McLeod County Fairgrounds in Hutchinson, Minnesota.

The following are directions to the fairgrounds:

South from St. Cloud

Drive south on HWY 15 through Hutchinson's Main Street. When you reach McDonald's, turn right (west) at the stoplight onto Century Ave. Go approximately .75 miles; the fairground is on your left. Enter through the main gate.

North from New Ulm

From HWY 15 South, turn left (west) at the third stoplight (McDonald's) onto Century Ave. Go approximately .75 miles; the fairground is on your left. Enter through the main gate.

From Buffalo Lake/Hector Area on HWY 212

Continue east on HWY 212, take a left (north) on HWY 15. From HWY 15 South, turn left (west) at the third stoplight (McDonald's) onto Century Ave. Go approximately .75 miles; the fairground is on your left. Enter through the main gate.

West from Glencoe

Go west on HWY 22, take a left on Airport Road. Cross HWY 15. Approximately one mile later take a right into the South Gate of the fairgrounds.

West from Minneapolis

Go west on HWY 7, turn left on HWY 15. Drive south on HWY 15 through Hutchinson's Main Street. When you reach McDonald's, turn right (west) at the stoplight onto Century Ave. Go approximately .75 miles; the fairground is on your left. Enter through the main gate.

The Poultry Barn is building number 19 on the map of the fairgrounds.



The egg contest will be held on Saturday afternoon starting at approximately 1:30pm. There is no fee for the egg contest. There are four classes for the egg contest: bantam pullet, bantam hen, large fowl pullet, large fowl hen.

The following rules apply to the egg contest:

- 1. Ameraucana eggs only.
- 2. Awards will be given for the "Best" and "Reserve" Large Fowl and Bantam eggs.
- 3. Entries will consist of six eggs presented in a suitable container of the entrant's choice.
- 4. Exhibitors may enter the same class more than once only if each entry represents a different Ameraucana variety and/or under hen or pullet status. Entries from pens or flocks of commingled varieties shall be limited to one per class and shall be designated "Various" on the entry form.
- 5. No unsolicited remarks by any exhibitor may be made within hearing of the judge during the judging process. Violations will result in automatic disqualification of all entries of the violator(s).
- 6. All entries become the property of the Ameraucana Breeders Club at the time of entry.
- 7. Two out of each entry of six eggs will be opened by the judge or the clerk to facilitate the judging of interior qualities and coloring.
- Each class will be judged to third place.

If you are interested in participating in the egg contest, but will not be able to attend in person please contact Jerry DeSmidt to arrange for the receipt of your shipped eggs.

Black Gold Ameraucana Proposed Variety Standard, Spring 2001

A few months ago on the Ameraucana Forum, Mike Gilbert asked if anyone had the original plumaged description for black gold. I replied that I knew I had it some where . . . I just needed to find it. After searching through my old bulletins, I found it in the very first bulletin I received spring 2001. In the summer bulletin, due to printing issues, these pictures where not printed in color and I have included the description and the pictures for everyone's convenience. The original proposed name for the variety was golden quail, but there was so much confusion that the name was changed to black gold at the 2004 National Meet in Portage, WI, although if memory serves the following description was not changed at that time.

Color of Male

COMB, FACE, AND EARLOBES: Red

HEAD: Golden bav

BEARD & MUFFS: Light golden brown tinged with grey

NECK: Hackle - Golden bay, slight black striping permitted in lower hackle

Front of Neck - Golden orange

BACK: Golden bay, each feather penciled with a single broad band of black

SADDLE: Brilliant black, each feather laced with golden orange and with straw colored shafting

TAIL: Main Tail - black with straw colored shafting

Sickles, Lesser Sickles and Coverts - brilliant black with light orange shafting and

thinly laced with light orange

WINGS: Bows – Deep orange bay

Coverts - Orange bay

Primaries – Dull black, leading edge light gold coarsely stippled with black, straw

colored shafting

Secondaries - Black, lower edge orange-gold stippled with black, producing a wing

bay of orange gold heavily stippled with black

BREAST: Upper breast – same as front of neck

Lower breast and Upper Thighs – Orange gold, each feather having a broad

single penciling of black

BODY, STERN, and FLUFF: Dull black irregularly barred with light golden orange

LOWER THIGHS: Same as body and stern

UNDERCOLOR: Slate

Color of Female

COMB AND FACE: Red

EARLOBES: Very pale, conforming to color of skin

HEAD: Light golden bay

BEARD & MUFFS: Light golden brown tinged with grey

NECK: Hackle - Light golden bay, striping in lower hackle permitted

Front of Neck and Upper Breast – Golden orange

BACK AND CUSHION: Black, finely laced and shafted with bright golden straw Main Tail - Black, finely laced and shafted with bright golden straw

Coverts - Same as main tail

WINGS: Shoulders, Fronts, Bows, and Coverts - Dull black, finely laced and shafted with bright golden straw

Primaries – Dull black, leading edge light bordered with golden straw

Secondaries – Black, shafted with golden straw, leading edge stippled with golden

straw

From Under the Black Locust, by Michael Muenks

When I first joined the Ameraucana Breeders Club Don Cable was the secretary/treasurer and in each bulletin he wrote a piece entitled Under the Mulberry Tree. While I have several mulberry trees in the yard and on the farm, a better tree for me to write from under is the black locust. We have many black locust trees that grow here in the yard around and over our house; so as I put my fingers to the keyboard in the tradition of the secretary/treasurers from years past I am thinking of all of their contributions to the Ameraucana Breeders Club.

Spring 2008 was a "real" spring here in Missouri. We had a long and cool spring which is unusual for Missouri and this summer has also been wet and mostly cool. We are about fifteen inches ahead on rainfall for the year. One side benefit has been the large amount of fruit produced here. It has been at times unbelievable the amount of fruit we have had this summer. The apple and pears will finish out what has been an amazing year in the next six weeks. The crisp mornings of the last month make me think that winter is just around the corner. In fact there are leaves already changing!

In the Ameraucana world here under the black locusts it has been a long and frustrating spring and summer. The hens started to lay late, despite my best efforts, and fertility has been terrible for most of the year. As I write from under the locust tree I hear in the background a few Ameraucana chicks have just hatched. There will be many more late hatches this summer to try to fill in the amount of chicks I would like to have in order to achieve some breed and variety improvements in 2008. There have been several bright spots in the hatching season. The only buff bantam pullet I have from 2007, which has a damaged eye, started to lay very late, but has ended up being a good producer of nicely colored eggs. I have been really worried about my buff bantams. I love their personality and charm, but the fertility has been low. Hopefully new blood will help along with a cross back to wheaten. I have been struggling with general egg production with by wheaten/blue wheaten bantams and I think a cross will be helpful to all three varieties.

I am looking forward to the fall show season and hope to make it to a couple of shows and the National Ameraucana Meet. I failed to attend any spring shows much to my personal disappointment and relief. I have been dealing a liver aliment since right after the 2007 Ameraucana National Meet. I won't go into the details, but I understand completely anyone with chronic fatigue. After some recent unplanned surgery I am now feeling a little better each week and I hope to make a full recovery in time.

A few years ago in an Ameraucana Breeders Club bulletin, Mike Gilbert mentioned a book entitled <u>Starting Where You Are with What You Have</u>, by Ralph Sturgeon as being the conceptual base for many of his breeding practices. Mike kindly allowed me to borrow and read his copy of the book which has been out of print for many years. I continue to what the Poultry Press as book collections are offered for sale as well as other online book retailers for the title with the hope that some day I will be able to find a copy. I thought it would be timely to discuss and demonstrate my application of the philosophy within the book.

Some of the new members will have missed the story of my ongoing battle with a red fox I shared on the ABC Forum in spring 2007, which I eventually won. In the aftermath of the battle I was left with no wheaten or blue wheaten bantam hens and no silver bantam cocks. As many people do after such a loss, I looked for replacement birds so that I could continue progress toward my breeding goals. Unfortunately, I was not able to find any replacement birds as is generally the case in these situations. Based on what I had, I decided to start where I was with what I had and cross my silver hens with my blue wheaten cock. John Blehm had shown me the results of such a cross and I new how he was using the resulting birds to improve both his silver and wheaten large fowl. I know you may be thinking that it would have made more sense and been guicker to use wheaten x buff and black x silver, but I didn't have the necessary birds and had to start with what I had. In the back of my mind I was considering the creation of blue silver to pair with silver bantam Ameraucana, but my true end goal was to recover breeding stock and to improve the breed and the silver and wheaten varieties. The pictures included with this article show mature pullets and cockerels from the cross. The chicks from this initial cross all had down that was of the "wild" type. Similar to the down of a silver chick, but the stripes where not as regular and the color of the down on the bright yellow side. The chicks did not mature with the wheaten color phase changes, but instead feathered as in the silver.

In the meantime, I was able to obtain a silver bantam cockerel in fall 2007 and I am currently using him as my flock sire, but I do plan to use the blue wheaten x silver cockerel in the coming weeks with my silver hens to complete the process of the cross. The pullet produced from the initial cross has been a very good producer with nicely colored eggs and she is now with the silver cock and will be rotated to a wheaten cock if I decide to keep the few wheaten bantams I have.
